2018-19 STATE BUDGET FALLS SHORT

In mid-June, the legislature approved its version of the state budget and sent it to Governor Brown for his final signature. However, as has become typical of the budget process, most of its provisions were decided behind closed doors with Republicans locked out of the discussions.

My colleague Senator John Moorlach of Orange County, who served on the budget conference committee, said it well during the floor debate on the budget process: "The real work is supposedly done by the Governor, by the Speaker of the Assembly, and the President pro Tem...it appears that the budget conference committee is almost virtually unnecessary...we ought to take a hard look at this process...I'm just advising you colleagues that we either follow the rules or we dissolve the conference committee."

Under this budget crafted together by Democratic leadership, we see mismanagement, overspending, and little concern for taxpayers as big government programs are prioritized that dedicate over \$1 billion to the failing high-speed rail project, spend almost \$2 billion collected from overtaxed drivers, and lay groundwork for government-run health care that is estimated to cost Californians at least \$400 billion.

This budget tramples on private property rights through eminent domain, blocks potential new water storage, hikes electricity costs on ratepayers through modifications to the grid, and raises fees at the DMV – even after forcing through the largest gas tax hike in history last year.

In January, the governor and my colleagues across the aisle hailed a multi-billion-dollar budget surplus. Yet even when the state is Continued in column 2

supposedly flush with cash they still cannot resist the reflexive urge to nickel -and-dime hard-working Californians.

Rather than give the people of this state a break and reward them for building a strong economy, this budget doubles down on the policies that make California so unaffordable.

It was on June 13, 1966 that the United States Supreme Court made its decision in the landmark case Miranda v. Arizona.

In the case, defendant Ernesto Miranda was questioned by police officers without being given a full and effective warning of his rights, leading to police obtaining a written confession from Miranda. The Supreme Court rules that this was a violation of the Fifth Amendment right against compelled self-incrimination. As a result of the ruling, anyone in police custody must be read their "Miranda rights" before being questioned.

WHY FIREWORKS ON JULY 4?

Fireworks are as much a part of America's Independence Day celebration as 4th of July barbecues, family parties, flagwaving, and heart-stirring patriotic music. But how did an ancient Chinese custom, rooted in war, come to be the quintessential American expression of freedom? You can thank John Adams.

Harken back to the sweltering summer of 1776. That was when the Continental Congress moved from passing a resolution that the colonies should abolish their colonial constitutions in favor of their own, independent constitutions, to ultimately declaring independence from the Crown. When all was said and done, John Adams wrote to his wife, Abigail, and explained how he felt the event should be commemorated.

"I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more."

What you may not know is that the date to which Adams was referring was July 2, not July 4. Nothing really happened on July 4, except for a procedural vote in which Congress voted to approve Thomas Jefferson's final draft of the Declaration of Independence. Congress actually voted to declare independence two days earlier, on July 2.

The following year – July 4, 1777 – Philadelphia put on a grand display of fireworks (what Adams called "illuminations"), and an American tradition was born.

But why fireworks in addition to "pomp and parade"?

Even by Adams' time, fireworks had been around for centuries, having been developed in China beginning around 600 CE to 900 CE. They made their way across to the West, made possible by the opening of the Silk Road in the 13th century. By 1533 they were in use in England, having been launched to commemorate the coronation of Anne Boleyn as Queen of England.
