The meeting was called to order by **President Sharon Durbin** on October 22, 2018. Reports were given. Senator Stone** noted that the Democrats have a super majority in the Assembly, but not in the Senate. The Senate Republicans are joined in their mission to stop Democrat spending programs.

SUPERVISOR KEVIN JEFFRIES

(The following gives rational for Supervisor Jeffries' stance on additional warehouses in the March area. It does impact the San Jacinto Valley)

Freeways & Warehouses. My votes to oppose some of the new large warehouse proposals at the March Joint Powers Authority (industrial business corridor along the 215) were not really about opposing mega warehouse buildings (although they are not very attractive) and definitely not a hostility towards the jobs they create. My opposition is more about the condition of all our local freeways. I do not have to tell you that our current freeways are in a constant state of gridlock. Out-of-county commuters lose three or four hours of their lives every day, families lose time together, businesses lose productivity, and drivers are losing their cool with each other. So when I'm critical of the prospects of adding more tractortrailer rigs to our current congestion, please understand that I believe our county has reached its maximum pain threshold and that we need to find solutions instead of making things worse. That doesn't mean I'll oppose all of them, especially the smaller ones who were previously legally zoned for that sort of use and aren't in the middle of residential neighborhoods, but I do want to hold them all to a higher standard to mitigate any community impacts.

PEARL HARBOR Sunday, December 7, 1941 DAY OF INFAMY

December 7, 1941— a day that will live in History — the day that marked the United States' decision to enter WWII. There are fewer and fewer of Pearl Harbor survivors left to share their memories. Let's not forget what they endured.

The surprise attack took place on a peaceful Sunday morning of December 7, 1941 on the "paradise" island of Oahu. The time of the attack was a short or long two hours. The surprise military strike conducted by the Imperial Japanese Navy against the United States naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii was a preventive action in order to keep the U.S. Pacific Fleet from interfering with military actions the Empire of Japan was planning in Southeast Asia.

The destruction in two hours was phenomenal. The base was attached by 353 Japanese fighters, bombers and torpedo planes in two waves, launched from six aircraft carriers. All eight U.S. Navy battleships were damaged, with four being sunk. Of these eight damaged, two were raised, and with four repaired, six battleships returned to service later in the war. The Japanese also sank or damaged three cruisers, three destroyers, an anti-aircraft training ship, and one minelayer. There were 188 U.S. aircraft destroyed: 2 402 Americans were killed and 1 282

aircraft destroyed; 2,402 Americans were killed and 1,282 wounded.

Important base installations such as the power station, shipyard, maintenance, and fuel and torpedo storage facilities, as well as the submarine piers and headquarters building (also home of the intelligence section) were not attacked! The Pacific Fleet aircraft carriers remained intact.

Japanese losses were light: 29 aircraft and five midget submarines lost, and 65 servicemen killed or wounded. One Japanese sailor was captured.



The attack came as a profound shock to the American people and led directly to the American entry into World War II in both the Pacific and European theaters.

THE LEGEND OF ST. NICHOLAS

The legend of Santa Claus can be traced back hundreds of years to a monk named St. Nicholas. It is believed that Nicholas was born sometime around 280 A.D. in Patara, near Myra in modern-day Turkey. Much admired for his piety and kindness, St. Nicholas became the subject of many legends.

It is said that he gave away all of his inherited wealth and traveled the countryside helping the poor and sick. One of the best known of the St. Nicholas stories is that he saved three poor sisters from being sold into slavery or prostitution by their father by providing them with a dowry so that they could be married.

Over the course of many years, Nicholas's popularity spread and he became known as the protector of children and sailors. His feast day is celebrated on the

anniversary of his death, December 6. This was traditionally considered a lucky day to make large purchases or to get married.

By the Renaissance, St. Nicholas was the most popular saint in Europe. Even after the Protestant Reformation, when the veneration of saints began to be discouraged, St. Nicholas maintained a

positive reputation, especially in Holland.

The name Santa Claus evolved from Nick's Dutch nickname, Sinter Klaas, a shortened form of



Sint Nikolaas (Dutch for Saint Nicholas). In 1804, John Pintard, a member of the New York Historical Society, distributed woodcuts of St. Nicholas at the society's annual meeting. The background of the engraving contains now-familiar Santa images including stockings filled with toys and fruit hung over a fireplace. In 1809, Washington Irving helped to popularize the Sinter Klaas stories when he referred to St. Nicholas as the patron saint of New York in his book, The History of New York. As his prominence grew, Sinter Klaas was described as everything from a "rascal" with a blue three-cornered hat, red waistcoat, and yellow stockings to a man wearing a broadbrimmed hat and a "huge pair of Flemish trunk hose."
