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HEMET POLIC CHIEF EDDIE PUST TO KEYNOTE JUNE MEETING



The Hemet San Jacinto Congress of Republicans will welcome Hemet Police Chief Eddie Pust as its keynote speaker. In May the HSJCR had a comprehensive update on law enforcement on the County level; this month the group will hear what is

happening on the local level. This promises to be an informative, interesting meeting.

Hemet Police Chief Eddie Pust is well qualified to lead the Hemet Police Department as his career has covered all aspects of local police work. He began his career with the City of Hemet Police Department in 1996 and in 1999 he was assigned to a multi-agency Major Narcotic Task Force, where he worked with allied agencies in the local, state and federal level.

In 2003 he was instrumental in the development of the Crime Suppression Unit and in 2006 was promoted to corporal and assigned to a patrol division as a field supervisor and as a watch commander. In 2014 Eddie Pust was promoted to Lieutenant and had the opportunity to command different bureaus of the department such as the Patrol Operations Bureau, the Public Safety Dispatch Center and the Investigations Bureau. In 2018 Eddie was

promoted to the rank of Captain and oversaw Operations including the Patrol Division, Investigations Bureau, Field Training Program, Special Operations Unit (SWAT) and Gang Task Force. He was a SWAT member for 13 years and commander for 3 years.

POLICE STATISTICS

The following is an excerpt from <u>Newsmax</u>, June 2021 issue, page 22 "Stop Screaming for Police Reform and Look at Facts". Bernard Kerik.

....Cops target crime; they don't target people.....

Last year, according to a <u>Washington Post</u> database of fatal police shootings:

- Police fatally shot 1,021 people
- ♦ 983 were male
- ♦ 38 were female
- ♦ 457 were white
- ♦ 243 were Black
- ◆ 170 were Hispanic
- ♦ 151 were classified as other.

Of the 1,021 people shot, 55 were unarmed, 24 being white, 18 Black, 8 Hispanic, and 5 classified as other races.

In both categories of suspects—armed and unarmed—there were far more whites shot and killed than Blacks. That trend was the same for the previous 3 years....

Bottom line: You can argue about a lot of things, but you can't argue with facts....

FLAG DAY The Stars and Stripes originated as a result of a resolution adopted by the Marine committee of the Second

Continental Congress at Philadelphia on June 14, 1777. The resolution read: "*Resolved, that the flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation.*"

The resolution gave no indication how the stars should be arranged; consequently, some arranged the stars in rows, and some in a circle. Ultimately, the design featured 13 white stars in a circle on a field of blue and 13 red and white stripes—one for each state. The number of stars increased as the new states entered the Union, but the number of stripes stopped at 15 and was later returned to 13.

The first celebration of the U.S. Flag's birthday was held in 1877 on the 100th anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777. However, it is believed that the first annual recognition of the flag's birthday dates back to 1885 when school teacher, B.J. Cigrand, first organized a group of Wisconsin school children to observe June 14, the 108th anniversary of the official adoption of The Stars and Stripes, as the Flag's Birthday. Cigrand, now known as 'Father of Flag Day,' continued to publicly advocate the observance of June 14 as the flag's birthday.

Within a few years as many as 36 state and local governments began adopting the annual observance. For over 30 years Flag Day remained a state and local celebration.

In 1916, the anniversary of the Flag Resolution of 1777 became a nationally observed event by a proclamation by President Woodrow Wilson. However, it was not designated as National Flag Day until August 3, 1949 when President Harry Truman signed legislation designating June 14 of each year as National Flag Day.

HISTORY OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY-1800'S

The first official Republican meeting took place on July 6th, 1854 in Jackson, Michigan. The name "Republican" was chosen because it alluded to equality and reminded individuals of Thomas Jefferson's Democratic-Republican Party.

In 1856, the Republicans became a national party when John C. Fremont was nominated for President under the slogan: "Free soil, free labor, free speech, free men, Fremont." Four years later, Abraham Lincoln became the first Republican to win the White House.

During the Civil War, against the advice of his cabinet, Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation that freed the slaves. The Republicans of their day worked to pass the Thirteenth Amendment, which outlawed slavery, the Fourteenth, which guaranteed equal protection under the laws, and the Fifteenth, which helped secure voting rights for African-Americans.

A few years ago, the District of Columbia celebrated "Emancipation Day" - commemorating the Republican Party's abolition of slavery in the nation's capital on April 16, 1862. That's right, the Republican Party freed the slaves in DC, despite fierce opposition from the Democrats. Of course, no one in the present DC Government dares mention that fact, since the true heritage of the Grand Old Party is what Republicans should know and Democrats should fear.
