



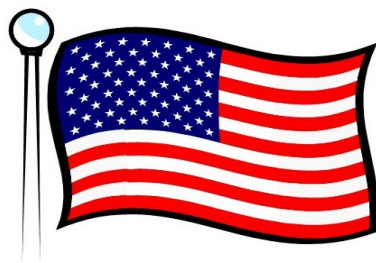

Kelly Seyarto is a native Southern Californian. After graduating from High School, he took an interest in fire fighting and started his career as a Paid Reserve Firefighter in La Verne. He was later hired by the Inglewood Fire Department as a Firefighter/Paramedic. He retired in 2015 at the rank of Battalion Chief after a 35 year career.

After moving their family to the newly incorporated City of Murrieta in 1991, Kelly became involved in local politics, and was elected to the City Council in 1997. He served four terms as Mayor of the City of Murrieta.

After serving three terms on the City Council, (1997-2006; 2016-2020), Kelly Seyarto was elected to the State Assembly representing the 67th District.

Budget News: The 2021-22 County budget was approved by the Board of Supervisors and it was mostly good news for Riverside County. Despite our fears at the beginning of the COVID Crisis last year, revenues (taxes & fees) have been coming in very strong. Although government will NEVER have enough money to satisfy its thirst, your tax dollars were able to keep essential county services at respectable levels and even provide a boost to some. Here are some details from the \$6.9 billion budget:

*Fire – The County's longtime partner and contractor (CAL FIRE) was able to substantially reduce its statewide overhead charges to the County (& contract cities), saving millions of dollars. This money is largely being reinvested back into the department to purchase needed apparatus and equipment. Additionally, the Board was able to bump up funding to add additional staffing to help with overtime impacts and to fund three patrol rigs to help with surge capacity when multiple fires occur in our county.

*Deputies – The Sheriff's Department will be bumping up its recruitment efforts for patrol deputies, local tax dollars will be funding \$5.5 million in additional patrol positions for unincorporated communities.

*Behavioral Health – Nearly every Sheriff station across the county had been previously approved for a Community Behavioral Assessment Team (CBAT) which works with local contract cities and unincorporated communities to provide behavioral health clinicians in the field with deputies to help respond to "behavioral health-related calls" (including drug-related issues). The only Sheriff station (at least in the western half of the county) that had NOT been included in the original CBAT staffing was the Lake Elsinore Station. That void is now being fixed with this new budget! (continued in column 2)

FREEDOM

Have you ever wondered what happened to the 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died.

Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned.

Two lost their sons serving in the Revolutionary Army; another had two sons captured.

Nine of the 56 fought and died from wounds or hardships of the Revolutionary War.

These patriots signed, pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor.

What kind of men were they?

Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners; men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships "blasted" to the bottom of the ocean by the British Navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

Thomas McKeam was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward. Vandals or soldiers looted the properties of Dillery, Hall, Clymer, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Rutledge, and Middleton.

At the battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr, noted that the British General

Cornwallis had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. He quietly urged General George Washington to open fire. The home was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his gristmill were laid to waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home to find his wife dead and his children gone. A few weeks later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart.

Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. They were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more. Standing tall, straight, and unwavering, they pledged: **"For the support of this declaration, with firm reliance on the protection of the divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."**

They gave you and me a free and independent America. The history books never told you a lot about what happened in the Revolutionary War. We didn't fight just the British. We were British subjects at that time and we fought the British imposed government, for the right to govern our own country! Unfortunately, many Americans take these liberties for granted -- but we shouldn't. Please take a few moments (at least) to remember the price paid for your freedom. Publicly and privately remember the patriots who gave so much, for you and me.

THE UN's COWARDLY CONTEMPT FOR WOMEN!

(Excerpts from AMAC Magazine, Aaron Kliegman, June 2021, page 24.)

“...the united Nations (UN)—founded largely to protect human rights—...elected Iran’s cruel and misogynistic regime to its Commission on the Status of Women.

To appreciate how outrageous this vote is, look no further than the UN’s own words. Just last month, the UN reported that the Iranian regime ‘violates and undermines women’s dignity and fundamental human rights, including the right to equality and non-discrimination.’ The same report detailed how ‘the legal age for a girl to marry in the Islamic Republic of Iran is 13 years, with even younger girls allowed to marry with paternal and judicial consent.’...Iran ‘effectively devalues the worth of a woman’s life to half that of a man, and consequently makes women more vulnerable to crime.’

JULY DATES

July 4, 1776: The Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress.

July 12, 1994: Germany’s Constitutional Court ended the ban on sending German troops to fight outside the country. The ban had been in effect since the end of World War II. The ruling allowed German troops to join in United Nations and NATO peace-keeping missions.

British pottery designer Josiah Wedgwood (1730-1795) was born in Burslem, Staffordshire, England.

July 14, 1913: Gerald R. Ford, the 38th U.S. President was born in Omaha, Nebraska (as Leslie King). In 1973 he was appointed vice president following the resignation of Spiro T. Agnew. He became president on August 9, 1974, following the resignation of Richard M. Nixon. He was the first non-elected vice president and non-elected president of the U.S.

July 16, 1769: San Diego was founded as the Mission San Diego de Alcalá by Father Junipero Serra.

July 18, 1947: President Harry Truman signed an Executive Order determining the line of succession if the president becomes incapacitated or dies in office. Follow the vice president, the speaker of the house and president of the Senate are next in succession. This became the 25th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ratified on February 10, 1967.

July 26, 1944: The U.S. Army began desegregating its training camp facilities. Black platoons were then assigned to white companies in a first step toward battlefield integration. However, the official order integrating the armed forces didn’t come until July 26, 1948, signed by President Harry Truman.

July 31, 1790: The U.S. Patent Office first opened its doors. The first U.S. patent was issued to Samuel Hopkins of Vermont for a new method of making pearlsh and potash. The patent was signed by George Washington and Thomas Jefferson.

Apparently, none of this was concerning to the UN’s 54-nation Economic and Social Council, which elected Iran to the ‘principal global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women.’

...to quote Hillel Neuer, executive director of UN Watch, electing Iran to protect women’s rights ‘is like making an arsonist into the town fire chief.’ And yet, the UN Charter, adopted in 1945, lists ‘equal rights of men and women’ as one of its fundamental principles. The UN even has the audacity to claim gender equality ‘is at the very heart of human rights and United Nations values’ and ‘protecting and promoting women’s human rights is the responsibility of all states.’

The U.S. has been completely silent on the UN vote.”
