REPUBLICAN PARTY OF RIVERSIDE COUNTY CHAIRMAN DON DIX TO KEYNOTE OCTOBER MEETING

The **Hemet San Jacinto Congress of Republicans** is honored to welcome **Republican Party of Riverside County** Chairman **Don Dix** as the October 25 General Membership meeting speaker.

Don is truly an activist who is transplanted from the East Coast. He was born and raised in Maryland, but remained in California following college where he entered the financial services industry in the early 1980's. After receiving his CFP designation from the College for Financial Planning, he spent a lifelong career providing comprehensive financial consulting to a broad base of clients.

In 2013, **Mr. Dix** co-founded the Unite IE Coalition, a network of 20+ conservative groups throughout the Inland Empire region of Southern California, to better organize the impact of community based activist groups and their messaging of conservative values.

For several years, **Don** co-hosted a daily talk show on AM 590. He now hosts 'The Inland Empire Answer' which features discussion and commentary on headline news from a conservative perspective. It is heard daily from 6-7 p.m. and 5-6 a.m. on Am 590.

He is an elected member of the **Riverside County Republican Party**; and, in January, was elected by the Members of the Committee to Chair the Republican Party of Riverside County. In a short time, he built a volunteer effort that led Riverside County to be the only large county to Recall Governor Newsom.

Several members have expressed a desire to get involved in electing Republicans in Riverside County and to participate in other 'activist' activities. Come to the meeting on October 25 to see where you can fit in the volunteer scheme.

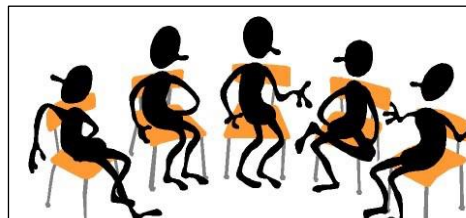
DID YOU KNOW.....

Hyatt Elementary School was named after Edward Hyatt, a high school teacher in San Jacinto in the late 1800s when Riverside County was part of San Diego and San Bernardino Counties. Hyatt was the first elected Riverside County Superintendent of Schools when Riverside first became a county. **Hyatt was a Republican** and won his election over a Democrat who had been appointed Superintendent. He later became State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Is Traditional Zoning Gone for Homes? If you live in a typical single family home development, and like your neighborhood, and moved there because you like the lawn and space between homes, I may have some bad news for you: the state of California has decided that one of the ways they're going to solve the (admittedly serious) housing crisis is by putting new houses on YOUR block or cul-de-sac.

Because they know best, SB 9, recently signed by the Governor, would allow up to four residential units on nearly every residentially zoned lot, with only the most basic restrictions, and no opportunity for your local government to say no.

The Board of Supervisors has asked our Planning Department to give us a report soon on the possible ramifications of this new law, but it may create crazy development incentives to only approve small lots with no yards, versus larger one acre lots that could later be subdivided into four, with no further review by the County.

OKTOBERFEST

A WEDDING PARTY GONE RIGHT: The storied Oktoberfest history began as a wedding party. On October 12, 1810, Crown Prince Ludwig married Princess Therese of Sachsen-Hildburghausen. Typical German wedding traditions included a fancy party for royals, but Prince Ludwig decided to mix things up. Instead of a bougie affair, Ludwig and Therese decided to throw a party for the masses. They invited 40,000 residents of Munich to come to the city gates and join a party in the field. The fields were even renamed Theresienwiese (“Therese’s Meadow”), and the name has since stuck. (Pro tip: if you ask a German about Oktoberfest, be sure to call it *Wiesn*, since that’s what the locals call it)

AND WHAT A PARTY THEY HAD! The first Oktoberfest was six days of free food and drinks, dancing, and singing. While beer was drunk, however, it wasn’t the main focus. The party was such a success that the town capped the event with a horse race in honor of the happy couple. The people of Munich had so much fun that, in 1811, they decided that the horse race should become an annual tradition. And why not add in the beer, food, and other celebrations too.

AN EVOLVING TRADITION: Oktoberfest hasn’t always been just about beer and horses. After the first party, events like tree climbing, bowling, and swings were added, along with an agricultural fair. The organizers created *Trachten und Schützenzug*, a parade to highlight the traditional costumes of the brewers participating. This all quickly progressed to a full-on carnival, with rides and contests for the best porcelain, silver, and jewelry on display. Real food and beer stands started showing up in 1818, and, by 1819, the city fathers had taken over planning responsibility and made Oktoberfest a full-on yearly tradition.
