PEARL HARBOR Sunday, December 7, 1941 DAY OF INFAMY

CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

Following are Christmas traditions that are a bit unusual.

December 7, 1941— a day that will live in History — the day that marked the United States' decision to enter WWII. There are fewer and fewer of Pearl Harbor survivors left to share their memories. Let's not forget what they endured.

The surprise attack took place on a peaceful Sunday morning of December 7, 1941 on the "paradise" island of Oahu. The time of the attack was a short or long two hours. The surprise military strike conducted by the Imperial Japanese Navy against the United States naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii was a preventive action in order to keep the U.S. Pacific Fleet from interfering with military actions the Empire of Japan was planning in Southeast Asia.

The destruction in two hours was phenomenal. The base was attached by 353 Japanese fighters, bombers and torpedo planes in two waves, launched from six aircraft carriers. All eight U.S. Navy battleships were damaged, with four being sunk. Of these eight damaged, two were raised, and with four repaired, six battleships returned to service later in the war. The Japanese also sank or damaged three cruisers, three destroyers, an anti-aircraft training ship, and one minelayer. There were 188 U.S. aircraft destroyed; 2,402 Americans were killed and 1,282 wounded.

Important base installations such as the power station, shipyard, maintenance, and fuel and torpedo storage facilities, as well as the submarine piers and headquarters building (also home of the intelligence section) were not attacked! The Pacific Fleet aircraft carriers remained intact.

Japanese losses were light: 29 aircraft and five midget submarines lost, and 65 servicemen killed or wounded. One Japanese sailor was captured.

The attack came as a profound shock to the American people and led directly to the American entry into World War II in both the Pacific and European theaters.

(Editors Note: I was privileged to hear a speaker, Bob Satterfield from San Bernardino, who interviews any World War II Veteran who wishes to relate their story. He interviewed one of two survivors of the Arizona—they were in Honolulu on shore leave when the attack occurred. He also spoke with a gunner on a plane flying into Oahu when the Japanese were bombing. They landed the plane in spite of its being severed in half—our speaker had pictures. He had pictures of and interviewed the Navajo Code Talkers who are still alive on the Navajo Reservation. Amazing stories. All of these young boys gave their all for the freedom of the country they loved.)



Germany: German children leave a shoe outside the house of December 5, which is then filled with sweets overnight. Naughty children awake to find a tree branch in the shoe instead.

Ukraine: Ukrainians forego tinsel and baubles, instead decorating their Christmas trees with an artificial spider and web. According to Ukrainian legend, a poor widow and her children grew a Christmas tree from a pine cone, then realized they did not have anything to decorate it with. When spiders heard the children crying, they decorated their tree with beautiful webs. The spider symbolizes good luck for the new year.

Czech Republic: In the Czech Republic, unmarried women stand by a door and throw a shoe over their shoulder. If the toe is pointing towards the door when it lands, they will get married within the year.

Sweden: One Swedish tradition involves festive rice pudding. A peeled almond is hidden in the desert, and the person who finds it supposedly will be married within a year.

Great Britain: An age-old tradition dictates that each member of the family must stir the Christmas pudding mix in a clockwise direction before it's cooked, making a wish as they do so.

England: Santa Claus traditionally leaves presents in a child's stocking on Christmas Eve. However, naughty children may wake up on Christmas morning to find a lump of coal in their stockings.

Norway: There's no cleaning on Christmas Eve in Norway—all brooms are safely hidden away, in case they're stolen by witches and evil spirits.

Germany: Germans hide a pickle in the Christmas tree on Christmas Eve—the first child to discover it in the morning receives a gift.

Finland: Finnish people traditionally mark Christmas with a touching tribute to the dead. Families light candles at the graves of their departed loved ones, making Finnish graveyards a beautiful sight.

Greece: A Greek tradition is to have a shallow wooden bowl with a piece of wire across the rim. Hanging from the wire is a sprig of basil wrapped around a wooden cross. Water is kept in there and once a day, someone in the family dips the cross into the water to sprinkle it in each room of the house. It's believed to keep away "kallikantzaroi," AKA bad spirits. These bad spirits are thought to come out during the 12 days of Christmas, and they get into a house through a chimney - so many families keep fires burning for 12 days to keep them away.

Ireland: Christmas in Ireland is quite similar to Christmas in the US, but they do have one nice tradition that we don't. In Ireland, an old tradition says to leave a tall candle on the sill of the largest window of the house. The candle is lit after sunset on Christmas Eve and is supposed to burn all night long—it represents a welcoming light for Mary and Joseph.
