RIVERSIDE COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT CANDIDATES

In June Riverside County residents will be asked to caste their ballot for Superior Court Judges. These are 'non-partisan' races; however, the Republican candidates in the June Primary follow the Republican philosophy with emphasis on public safety, and well-being of Riverside County citizens.

At the May 23 General Membership Meeting, the **Hemet San Jacinto Congress of Republicans** will have an opportunity to meet and greet and hear the four candidates who have been endorsed by District Attorney Mike Hestrin and Sheriff Chad Bianco.

Deputy DA Jason Stone, Office #26: Deputy DA Stone has been at the Riverside County District Attorney's Office, first as a law clerk, and then as Deputy District Attorney since 2007. More than half of his career has been in the DA's Special Victims Unit, prosecuting cases involving Sexual Assault, Child Abuse, Human Trafficking, and Domestic Violence. He is known for being a firm but fair prosecutor.

Deputy DA Kristi Kirk, Office #28: Deputy DA Kirk has been with the Riverside County District Attorney's Office since graduation of law school in 2005. She has worked in all units in the Eastern Division, including juvenile, filings, misdemeanor and felony domestic violence prosecution. She has specialized in gang and homicide prosecution and has prosecuted complex civil and criminal gang prosecutions.

Deputy DA Natalie Lough, Office #4: Deputing District Attorney Natalie Lough is an experienced Deputy District Attorney in the Riverside County District Attorney's Office, a military spouse, and mother to two young boys. Her philosophy is to treat everyone who enters the courtroom with fairness, compassion, and respect.

Deputy DA Jay Kiel, Office #11. Deputy District Attorney Jay Kiel currently serves in Riverside County.

CALIFORNIA PRIMARY INFORMATION.

NAME(C)

Here are points regarding the June Primary election:

- All California active registered voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot.
- Last day to register is May 23,2022.
- Your ballot will include candidates for U.S. Senate and all Constitutional offices as well as Assembly, Congress, and State Senate.
- Two contests for U.S. Senate: One for a 6-year term ending January 3, 2029 and one for the remaindere of the current term ending January 3, 2023.
- Return you ballot—must be postmarked on or before election day and received by June 14, 2022 or in-person to a secure ballot drop box, to a voting location or your county elections office by 8 p.m. on June 7, 2022.
- In-person voting locations will offer voter registration, replacement ballots, accessible voting machines, and language assistance to those who need it.
- Vote centers open in all Voter's Choice Act counties on May 28, 2022.

Ballot drop off places in the San Jacinto Valley are: City of Hemet, Hemet Public Library, Valle Vista Community Center, City of San Jacinto, Valley Wide Parks and Recreation on May 9 through June 6. The hours are 10 to 3 except for Valley Wide which is 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. **Double check hours before taking your ballot in.**

In-person voting in Hemet is at Bautista Creek Elementary School, Hemet DPSS, Hemet Public Library, Our Lady of the Valley Catholic Church. In San Jacinto, it is at Mountain View Alternative High School, San Jacinto Library, Valley Wide Recretion and Park District. Voting is from May 28 to June 6, 9 to 5 and 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on June 4 through election day.

A Growing Rage – We have a beautiful County that offers diverse settings (mountains, desert, Wine Country, lakes, historic downtown areas, etc.) And while our communities keep growing, unfortunately so does the level of frustration. It really boils down to a quality of life question: *How much is enough?!*

Quality of life concerns include crime, homelessness, the cost of living (to name just a few) and of course the other big one, our endless gridlock! Gridlock on our stateowned highways (91, 15 & 215 & Ortega Hwy) is never ending, and Caltrans has mostly been converted away from building freeway capacity and instead into a highway maintenance agency. The gridlock is not confined to our freeways, but also overwhelms many local roads such as Cajalco, Temescal Canyon Rd, Van Buren, Alessandro, Bundy Canyon, Washington, etc. To make things even more challenging, the State mandates that counties and cities MUST provide for more affordable housing to be construction. Across our County, we must add 167,351 more water use)? Will our infrastructure needs ever catch up?

During my community meetings the same question is always asked of me. That being: How much is enough? How many more homes (affordable or not) must we add? How many more warehouses, how many more vehicles, how much more water (the biggest water district in Southern California just announced dramatic restrictions on water use)? Will our infrastructure needs ever catch up?

I recently had a respected friend suggest that our county (and cities) need to implement a "pause" in issuing permits until we can get on a path towards resolving our quality of life challenges. He's not wrong, but the paths (solutions) won't be easy. I doubt that a "pause" will happen (mainly because of our private property rights), but clearly, we are in trouble and need to rethink – *How much is enough?*

SENIOR SAVINGS

Newsmax May, 2022.

Most states offer seniors a discount on their home property taxes. Several, including Connecticut and Tennessee, freeze property tax for seniors. Others increase homestead exemptions. In Florida, there's an additional \$50,000 exemption for people over 65. In some states people with disabilities, low annual income, and veterans may also qualify for additional discounts. (ed. MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service. There are many stories as to its actual beginnings; however, it is likely due to each of the towns and every planned or spontaneous gathering of people to honor the war dead in the 1860's tapped into the general human need to honor our dead, each contributed honorably to the growing movement that culminated in General Logan giving his official proclamation in 1868. It is not important which town was the very first to decorate the graves of fallen heroes, but what is important is that Memorial Day was established.

Memorial Day was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic and was first observed on 30 May 1868, when flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any way.

It is now celebrated in almost every state on the last Monday in May passed by Congress with the National Holiday Act of 1971 to ensure a three-day weekend for Federal holidays.

Traditional observance of Memorial Day has diminished over the years. Many Americans have forgotten the meaning of Memorial Day. At many cemeteries, the graves of the fallen are increasingly ignored, neglected. What may be needed to return the solemn, and even sacred, spirit back to Memorial Day is for a return to its traditional day of observance. As the VJW stated, "changing the date merely to create three-day weekends has undermined the very meaning of the day. No doubt, this has contributed greatly to the general public's nonchalant observance of Memorial Day.



TRUMP SELLS D.C. HOTEL

Donald Trump's luxury hotel near the White House, which drew diplomats, lobbyists, and plenty of controversy while he was president, has been sold to a Miami investment group for \$375 million.
