The ten-year mystery is upon us again!! Who are the Federal, State, and County representatives for Hemet and San Jacinto???

Once again, the San Jacinto Valley is divided among three Assembly Members: 36AD Democrat Eduardo Garcia; 47AD Republican Gregg Wallis; and 60 AD Democrat Corey Jackson.

The Valley is divided between two State Senators, both of whom are Republicans: 32SD Kelly Seyarto and 23SD Rosalicie Ochoa Bogh.

The 25 Congressional District covers the entire San Jacinto Valley and is represented by Democrat **Raul Ruiz**.

The best way to determine who represents you in Sacramento is to google "Who is my Assembly person?" Put in your name and address and you'll get results. At this time, the State Senate and Congressional information is not up, but it will be eventually.

To complicate things on the Riverside County level, the San Jacinto Valley is represented by both Chuck Washington, East Hemet and Yxstian Gutierrez for the remainder of the Valley.

JONES ACT

The Jones Act is technically the Merchant marine Act of 1920 that requires ships that operate between U.S. ports be built in the United States, owned by U.S. companies and staff with U.S. crews. The nation is dependent on fewer than 100 ships for all domestic deliveries.

This has pushed deliveries onto rail and highways "even though shipping on water should be far cheaper, more environmentally friendly and less destructive of infrastructure."

The protectionist provisions drive up inflation and contribute to the supply chain bottlenecks. It makes our nation more dependent on foreign oil because it limits oil shipments within the U.S.

Democrats are striving to make the problems worse by introducing legislation to "Close Agency Loopholes to the Jones Act" which would stamp out virtually every remaining loophole raising oil and gas prices. This shows the power of domestic shippers and unions.

Budget & Pensions. The good news is that your county budget is doing very well. Taxpayers are generating lots of revenues (property taxes, sales taxes, DMV taxes, etc.). If you add these increases to the special COVID Cash that the federal government printing presses have sent to local counties and cities, the numbers jump even more.

Unfortunately, just as rising inflation is hurting families, the cost of doing business for the County has also skyrocketed. The cost to build new fire stations, pave streets, or build day care centers have gone through the roof. The other downside is that we know this big revenue jump is very likely a "one-time" scenario.

The State of California is already facing a revenue drop approaching \$20 billion, and the California pension system (CalPERS) is facing a very large drop in its investment portfolio, which typically translates into higher "contributions" (read: larger checks) from local governments to make up the difference.

One of my jobs during my last two years in office will be to make sure our county spending is kept under control, use chunks of any surplus funds to build up rainy-day reserves, pay down debt, and try to restrain new spending to "one-time expenses" so that we do not obligate our county to ongoing expenses with one-time revenues.

With our growing population (30,000 +/every year) and the resulting growing demands for increased services, it's going to be a real challenge to hold it all together!

A FEW MEMORABLE JANUARY DATES

January 4, 1809 - Louis Braille was born. He was three years old when an accident caused him to lose his sight.

January 5, 1976 - In Cambodia, the Khmer Rouge led by Pol Pot announced a new constitution which legalized the Communist government and renamed the country as Kampuchea. During the reign of Pol Pot, over 1 million persons died in "the killing fields" as he forced people out of the cities into the countryside to create an idyllic agrarian society. Educated and professional city people were especially targeted for murder and were almost completely annihilated. In January of 1979, the Pol Pot was overthrown by Cambodian rebels and Vietnamese troops.

January 19, 1966 - Indira Gandhi was elected prime minister of India in succession to Lal Shastri who had died eight days earlier. She served until 1975 and later from 1980 to 1984, when she was assassinated by her own bodyguards as she walked to her office. Her only surviving son, Rajiv, became the next prime minister. In 1991, he was assassinated while campaigning for reelection

January 24, 1965 - Winston Churchill (1874-1965) died. He had been Britain's wartime prime minister whose courageous leadership and defiant rhetoric fortified the British during their long struggle against Hitler. "I have nothing to offer but blood, toil, tears, and sweat," he stated upon becoming prime minister at the beginning of the war. Following the war, he coined the term "Iron Curtain" to describe the barrier between Eastern Europe under Russia's control and the free West.

January 24, 1972 - Japanese soldier Shoichi Yokoi was discovered on Guam after he had spent 28 years hiding out in the jungle not knowing World War II had long since ended.

January 25, 1533 - King Henry VIII married his second wife, Anne Boleyn, in defiance of Pope Clement who had refused to annul his first marriage. The King later broke all ties with Rome and became Supreme Head of the Church of England.

Birthday - <u>Douglas MacArthur</u> (1880-1964) was born on a military base in Little Rock, Arkansas. He commanded Allied forces during World War II in the Pacific. In 1942, he uttered one of the most famous phrases of the war, "I shall return," when forced to leave the Philippines due to the unchecked Japanese advance. When MacArthur appeared before Congress and announced his retirement, he declared, "Old soldiers never die - they just fade away."

January 25, 1947 - Gangster Al Capone, who once controlled organized crime in Chicago, died in Miami at age 48 from syphilis.

January 25, 1759 - Scottish poet Robert Burns was born.

January 28, 1807 - London's Pall Mall became the first street in the world to be lit by gas lights.
