WHAT IS THE REPUBLICAN NATIONAL COMMITTEE?

The Republican National Committee (RNC) is a U.S. political committee that is a part of the Republican Party of the United States.

The **RNC** was organized in 1856 at which time it had one member from each state and U.S. territories who served for a 4-year term.

Currently, there are three members from each state and territory: the National Committeeman, National Committeewoman, and Chair of the state Republican Party. In California, the Committeeman and Committeewoman are elected by delegates to the CAGOP. Shawn Steel is the Committeeman, Harmeet Dhillon is Committeewoman, and Jessica Patterson is the CAGOP Chair.

The **RNC** is responsible for developing and promoting the Republican brand and political platform, as well as assistfundraising and election ing in strategy.

It is also responsible for organizing and running the Republican National Convention. When a Republican is president, the White House controls the committee.

The RNC Chair is Ronna McDaniel. Thomas O. Hicks, Jr. is Co-Chair.

Columbus went ashore at Guanahaní, an island in the Bahamas, on October 12, 1492.
Christopher Columbus (Italian: <i>Cristoforo Colombo</i> was a Genoese explorer who led a Spanish enterprise to cross the Atlantic Operation of an alternative route to
the Atlantic Ocean in search of an alternative route to the Far East, only to land in the New World. Columbus's first voyage to the New World on the Spanish ships <i>Santa</i> "I used to eat a lot of natural foods until I learned that most people die of natural causes."
