JEFF GONZALEZ TO SPEAK

The **Hemet San Jacinto Congress of Republicans** February 26 meeting will host **Republican** assembly candidate, **Jeff Gonzalez.**

Jeff is a veteran Marine. He served four combat tours in Iraq and Afghanistan, and, after two decades of service, retired from the military and became a local pastor. Today, Jeff owns and operates three small businesses. Jeff is married and has four children. Three are adults and one is in his last year of high school. The oldest son is physically and mentally challenged and lives with Jeff and his wife.

Assemblymember Eduardo Garcia did not file for re-election, establishing Assembly District 36 as an open seat.

The **HSJCR** has extended an invitation to a representative of **Turning Point USA** to give a brief message on the organization.

March 5 Primary Candidates who are at the meeting will also be given time to speak.

RPRC ELECTION

The members of the Republican Party of Riverside County are elected in the March Presidential Primary every four years. The members elected in the March Primary will take office in January at the RPRC Organization Meeting. HSJCR members will find these HSJCR members on the ballot: Taryn Cagliero, Vinay Rao, Charlene Stover. They ask for your vote!

There are six members elected from each Assembly District. The San Jacinto Valley has three Assembly District: the 36AD, the 47AD and the 60AD. HSJCR member Taryn Cagliero is a candidate with 7 others in the 36AD. Also in the 36AD are Pam Levin and Billie Lee Smith who, along with Taryn, have served the RPRC and are strong candidates. Pam is RPRC Secretary. HSJCR members running in the 47AD are Vinay Rao and Charlene Stover. Incumbents in the 47AD are Grace Suchowski, Chad Schnitger, Vinay, Charlene, Doug Hassett and Joe Scarafone. Grace is Vice Chair and Chad chairs the GOTV effort. HSCR Candidates in the 60AD are Robin Lowe and Norm Kyriss. They will not be on the ballot as there are only five candidates in the 60 AD.

Third District Seeks General Plan **Advisory Committee Applicants**

The Riverside County Board of Supervisors has officially approved the 2024 Foundation General Plan Amendment (FGPA) cycle. The County is now accepting submissions from property owners for the FGPA, offering a two -month window for interested parties to request changes or exceptions to the County General Plan. Submissions will remain open until Friday, April 5, 2024.

The Planning Department has requested that each district nominate a representative for the General Plan Advisory Committee (GPAC) to prepare for this cycle. Eligible candidates are those with experience in fields related to land use, such as construction, real estate, landscaping, or civil engineering. Committee members must reside in the unincorporated areas of Riverside County, excluding those who live within city limits.

In the Third District, unincorporated communities include Anza, Aguanga, East (continued in Column 3)

Hemet, French Valley, Green Acres, Homeland, Lake Riverside, Romoland, Sage, South Valle Vista Winchester. The aim is to establish the GPAC by the end of February to begin deliberations on the submissions. The GPAC will conduct in-person meetings with virtual traveling constraints.

The GPAC will conduct in-person meetings with virtual accommodations for those who face traveling constraints.

FEBRUARY—BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History Month has its origin in 19th Century celebrations of Lincoln's Birthday by African-American communities in the United States. By the early 20th Century, black communities were annually celebrating Lincoln's birthday in conjunction with the birthday of former slave and abolitionist Frederick Douglass on February 14.

The precursor to Black History Month was created in 1926 when historian Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History announced that the second week of February would be "Negro History Week" to coincide with the commemorations of both men's birthdays.
