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## JULY KEYNOTE SPEAKER

The HSJCR is proud to welcome Senator Rosilicie Ochoa-Bogh as keynote speaker for the July 22, 2024 meeting. In addition to Senator Ochoa-Bogh, the HSJCR will be endorsing three candidates running for Assembly, State Senate and Congress. (see info below 'endorsements')

In November 2020, **Ochoa-Bogh** was elected to represent portion of both Hemet and San Jacinto and the nearly one million people of California's Senate District 23. The district spans from Big Bear to Menifee.

Senator Ochoa-Bogh is a native Californian and the daughter of Mexican immigrants. She is a graduate of San Bernardino High School and the University of California, Santa Barbara. She worked towards her teaching credential at California State University, San Bernardino and taught English language learners at the elementary school level. She has been a realtor for 20 years. Ochoa-Bogh served on the Yucaipa-Calimesa Joint Unified School District board and is a former board President of the Yucaipa Valley Chamber of Commerce former board member of the East Valley Association of Realtors.

She has been appointed vice chair of the committees on Education; Housing; Human Services; and Public Safety. She is also a member of the committees on Budget & Fiscal Review; Budget Subcommittee #1 on Education, Governmental Organization, Rules, Legislative Ethics and Joint Committee on Rules.

**Ochoa-Bogh** is a champion for stronger schools, lower taxes, better infrastructure, and more affordable home prices.

**Senator Ochoa-Bogh and Greg Bogh**, her husband of 26 years, live with their son, two daughters and a Cocker Spaniel named Penny in the city of Yucaipa.

#### **ENDORSEMENTS**

## THE MOST EXPENSIVE INDEPENDENCE DAY ON RECORD

(CaGOP Talking Points July 3, 2024)

Thanks to Bidenflation, 2024 will be the most expensive Fourth of July on record according to the American Farm Bureau.

- The cost of a Fourth of July cookout is up 5 percent from 2023 and up 30 percent from five years ago.
- Ground beef is up 11 percent, hamburger buns are up 7 percent, lemonade is up 12 percent, ice cream is up 7 percent, and chips are up 8 percent from last
- While food costs continue to rise, farm income is dropping, falling 17 percent in 2023 and expected to decrease another 25 percent this year.

After the Biden White House attempted to brag about the price of an Independence Day barbeque going down by \$0.16 in 2021, the meal same has since increased by \$11.72 since then.

- Overall, it will cost \$71.22 to host a cookout for 10 people this year, compared to less than \$55 pandemic.
- Americans are estimated to spend \$9.4 billion on food this weekend, compared to \$6.5 billion in 2019.

It's not just food that is costing more this year people wanting to celebrate with fireworks will feel it. too.

The average import price of fireworks in 2024 is \$1.61 per pound, up 42 percent from 2021.

People are adjusting their plans based on inflation.

- 60 percent of Americans plan to spend less on Fourth of July this year, with three out of five saying inflation has impacted their plans.
- Nearly two-thirds of Americans don't believe the founding fathers would be satisfied with the Biden economy.

Supervisor Kevin Jeffries **Endless Litigation.** For those of you who have worked in big government or a big business you likely already know that litigation (aka lawsuits) is a routine part of being in business. We are a society that rushes to court, particularly if a target is perceived to have "deep pockets".

Now before you write me a nasty gram, I am neither a defender of big business nor big government. Nor would I deny someone the right to be compensated for actual harm and injury. But in the case of your Riverside County government – the legal payout numbers are staggering and frustrating.

Over a ten (10) year period (7/1/14 to 6/10/24), the total of all jury and settlement payouts (excluding legal fees) exceeded \$241 million! It's an amount that makes vour blood boil.

Who were the top departments to be litigated over the 10 year period? Sheriff at \$99,633,565, Social Services \$57,466,570, Hospital/Health System \$38,523,859, and the Transportation Agency \$20,147,978. The top two peak payout years were 2014/15 (\$41mil) and 2018/19 (\$36mil).

The good news for taxpayers is that with internal reforms and accountability pushed by the Board - the litigation awards and settlements have generally been decreasing each year (\$7 mil 2021/22 and \$4.5mil 2022/23).

## JULY FOURTH

During the American Revolution, the legal separation of the thirteen colonies from Great Britain in 1776 actually occurred on July 2, when the Second Continental Congress voted to approve a resolution of independence that had been proposed in June by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia declaring the United States independent from Great Britain's rule. [6][7] After voting for independence, Congress turned its attention to the Declaration of Independence, a statement explaining this decision, which had been prepared by the Committee of Five, which asked Thomas Jefferson to author its first draft.

While Jefferson consulted extensively with the other four members of the Committee of Five, he largely wrote the Declaration of Independence in isolation over 17 days between June 11, 1776, and June 28, 1776, from the second floor he was renting in a three-story private home at 700 Market Street in Philadelphia, now known as the Declaration House, and within walking distance of Independence Hall.

Congress debated and revised the wording of the Declaration, removing Jefferson's vigorous denunciation of King George III for importing the slave trade, finally approving it two days later on July 4. A day earlier, John Adams wrote to his wife Abigail:

The second day of July 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more.

Adams's prediction was off by two days. From the outset, Americans celebrated independence on July 4, the date shown on the much-publicized Declaration of Independence, rather than on July 2, the date the resolution of independence was approved in a closed session of Congress.

Historians have long disputed whether members of Congress signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, even though Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and Benjamin Franklin all later wrote that they had signed it on that day. Most historians have concluded that the Declaration was signed nearly a month after its adoption, on August 2, 1776, and not on July 4 as is commonly believed.

By remarkable coincidence, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, the only two signatories of the Declaration of Independence later to serve as presidents of the United States, both died on the same day: July 4, 1826, which was the 50th anniversary of the Declaration. [16] Although not a signatory of the Declaration of Independence, James Monroe, another Founding Father who was elected president, also died on July 4, 1831, making him the third President who died on the anniversary of independence. The only U.S. president to have been born on Independence Day was Calvin

Coolidge, who was born on July 4, 1872.
